Pneumatic models are made from strong rubber and then filled with air. These tires are similar to the tires found on tractors and vehicles. Pneumatic tires create a cushion of air between the forklift and the ground, creating a comfortable ride for the operator while tremendously lessening the wear and tear on the machine. Traction is attained via deep treads, making it suitable for rough and uneven ground. Solid Tires Solid tires are an ideal choice for exterior job sites and interior facilities. Constructed from solid rubber, they remain safe from blowouts and pop similar to pneumatic tires with puncture wounds. Since these tires are not filled with air, they don't provide the same cushion attributes. Rough terrain areas cannot rely on these tires. Some models of solid tires are manufactured with holes in the sidewalls to offer a softer ride. This kind of construction features less capacity in terms of forklift load carrying. Polyurethane Tires These tires will generally outlast both of the rubber designs but are strictly designed for indoor warehouse use. Compared to rubber tires, polyurethane models provide a higher load capacity. In order to compensate for the additional battery weight, electric forklifts rely on polyurethane tires. These tires provide lower rolling resistance and extended battery life. There are numerous power sources for forklifts. Forklifts can utilize liquid propane, gas, batteries, LP gas or diesel. LP is preferred for various applications due to being a clean burning fuel. Many facilities that have huge supplies of liquid propane storage need a forklift to facilitate regular refueling. Additional locations have extra liquid propane cylinders to allow changing during the refueling process. Many safety measures need to be taken during the changing of the LP cylinder. For protection, goggles, heavy gloves and safety glasses need to be worn. The forklift ignition needs to be turned off prior to changing out the tank. Turning the cylinder valve tight closes the hose connection and it can be loosened with ones' hand. It is important to never use any wrenches or tools for connections that are supposed to be opened and closed by hand. Don't forget the valve will turn in the opposite direction of a normal connection. After, take away the restraining straps from the cylinder to allow it to be lifted free from the bracket and then you are ready to change the empty cylinder out for a full one. Always dispose of the empty cylinder by placing it in the properly designated location. Proper lifting techniques are required as full cylinders are heavy. Attach the hose connection to the new tank with your hand to ensure the seal is tight and secured. Next, turn the cylinder valve on slowly. After the valve has been turned on, ensure there are no leaks by listening closely. Immediately turn the valve off if a leak is detected and re-check the connections with the hose. There are a variety of applications for interior and exterior forklifts. Different models are excellent for outdoor construction site locations and rough terrain or interior areas. Flat surfaces are required for warehouse forklift models. There are many forklift categories; the lower classes are utilized for interior warehouse applications and the higher classes are designated for exterior jobs. Four types of warehouse forklifts can be chosen from the seven different classes of machines. Classes 1, 2 and 3 offer electric propulsion and are typically utilized for interior jobs. Classes 5 to 7 designate forklifts that are used for operating outside on rough surfaces or towing heavy loads. The internal combustion forklifts are designated under Class 4. Class 4 forklifts may be used inside however, they do generate some fumes and need to be used in open-air

situations and well-ventilated locations. There are four subcategories or lift codes that Class 1 forklifts can be further categorized into. Lift codes 1, 4, 5 and 6 designate various models. The Code 1 forklift allows the operator to stand and the lift codes 4, 5 and 6 mean the units are sit down models. Lift Code 4 forklifts feature three wheels; however, lift Code 5 forklifts stand for cushion tires and lift Code 6 forklifts offer pneumatic tires. Narrow aisle forklifts fall under the Class 2 models which are operated with a standing rider and utilized in tight spaces. Class 3 forklifts or electric models are also ideal for smaller spaces. Class 3 models feature an operator that either stands or walks behind the machine. Interior warehouses and similar locations that cannot use internal combustion or IC models frequently rely on electric units. Electric models have disadvantages and advantages. They can last longer and are considered more environmental. Upkeep costs are lower and they cost less to operate overall. Noise pollution reduction is also important in internal settings. Compared to internal combustion units, the electric forklifts cost more and cannot be used in bad weather. In order to facilitate continuous operation, have the electric forklifts charge every six hours and keep extra batteries on hand. Each industry can make use of an ideal forklift model.
